






#### Total Forward Programme 2014 /15 - 2017/18




- 21 LAs now providing 3-year programmes (up from 18 last year)

- No LA providing only a one-year programme (2 last year)




#### Programme by Sector 2014/15 - 2017/18 Total = £2757m



#### Programme by Sector 2014/15 Total = £1079m




#### Programme by Sector 2016/17 Total - £567m







#### North Wales by Sector 2014/15 -2017/18 Total = £595m



#### Mid Wales by Sector 2014/15 – 2017/18 Total = £248m




#### South West by Sector 2014/15 -2017/18 Total = £770m

# Why Revisit No Turning Back

- Original study was carried out in 2010
- Environment has changed politically and financially
- There have been developments within our Industry
- But has there been change and how much?



# What No Turning Back Argued

- We needed Leadership from WAG and Core Public Sector decision makers
- We needed improved and consistent tendering processes
- We needed adhering to Policy of Best Value
- We needed a willingness for Government, Clients and Suppliers to work in an Integrated and Collaborative way.



#### Structure and Format of Review

- Set 2 basic Questions/Objectives
- Set 3 fundamental areas to review
- Set a series of questions per review area
- Consult with the Industry via initial mass electronic questionnaires
- Direct meetings and phone interviews with those expressing willingness from questionnaires
- Analyse results and report findings
- Revisit No Turning Back Recommendations??
